

COUNSELOR PREPARATION COMPREHENSIVE EXAM

The Counselor Preparation Comprehensive Exam (CPCE) is a nationally administered multiple choice exam designed to evaluate professional knowledge students have acquired during their programs. The CPCE is designed to assess students' knowledge of counseling information viewed as important by programs preparing students for state licensing exams.

Additionally, the CPCE:

- Stimulates student integration of knowledge learned in separate courses
- Helps prepare students for the state licensing exams
- Gives students comparative strengths/weaknesses feedback
- Allows programs to examine student functioning in various curricular areas
- Gives programs an objective view of the knowledge level of their students
- Compares the program's results to national data

➤ **Passing the CPCE is a graduation requirement for MAC students admitted in or after Fall 2017.**

THE CPCE COVERS EIGHT CORE CURRICULUM AREAS

1. **Helping Relationships** [CN 501, 502]
 - Studies that provide an understanding of counseling and consultation processes.
2. **Professional Orientation & Ethics** [CN 506]
 - Studies that provide an understanding of all aspects of professional functioning including history, roles, organizational structures, ethics, standards, and credentialing.
3. **Human Growth & Development** [CN 507]
 - Studies that provide an understanding of the nature and needs of individuals at all developmental levels.
4. **Group Dynamics** [CN 520]
 - Studies that provide an understanding of group development, dynamics, counseling theories, group counseling methods and skills, and other group work approaches.
5. **Social & Cultural Foundations** [CN 513]
 - Studies that provide an understanding of issues and trends in a multicultural and diverse society.
6. **Career & Lifestyle Development** [CN 518]
 - Studies that provide an understanding of career development and related life factors.
7. **Research Methods & Program Evaluation** [CN 514]
 - Studies that provide an understanding of types of research methods, basic statistics, and ethical and legal considerations in research.
8. **Appraisal or Assessment Techniques** [CN 515]
 - Studies that provide an understanding of individual and group approaches to assessment and evaluation.

The eight core areas serve as the primary theoretical basis for guiding education to prepare students to become competent professional counselors.

The CPCE national norms are used to determine the minimum passing score on the exam. The minimum passing score varies each year. For more information about the CPCE, visit the official site: <https://www.cce-global.org/AssessmentsAndExaminations/CPCE>

REQUIREMENTS TO REGISTER FOR THE EXAM

Each applicant must

- have successfully completed all six prerequisites for MAC Practicum prior to sitting for the Exam.
- have a 3.0 GPA and be in good standing in the MAC program

Students applying for the CPCE are encouraged, but not required to have completed coursework covering the eight core areas listed above.

REGISTRATION PROCEDURES

Students will apply to take the CPCE by filling out the MAC Program CPCE Application, and submitting it to the Counseling Program Administrative Assistant via email, fax, or mailbox. *It will cost the exam taker \$75.00 to take the exam (this is paid to Pearson Vue).*

FORMAT OF THE CPCE

The CPCE consists of 160 items with 20 items per section. Western Seminary is responsible for determining a minimum required score for their students. A demographic questionnaire will be included on the answer sheet for research purposes. Students are allowed four hours to complete the examination. After the examination, we will contact students with their results. Results will be posted approximately 4 weeks after the test administration. Your score will place you on a continuum of percentiles in comparison to national norms. For example, if you score at the 50th percentile you are exactly at the center of the comparison group.

EXAM RESULTS

Completed exams are scored by the Center of Credentialing and Education (CCE). Once scores have been calculated, they are returned to the Western Seminary San Jose Counseling Dept. Examinees receive a notification from the Counseling Dept. informing them of their score on the exam.

RETESTING

Students may take the exam any semester they wish but are strongly encouraged to take it at least one semester prior to their anticipated graduation. If a student does not pass after two attempts, the student must register for a two credit individualized study course and subsequently re-take and pass the exam. If further re-takes are necessary, students are limited to one attempt per semester until they achieve a passing score. Each time you take the test you will need to go through the entire registration process.

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
