Counseling Outside of the Box and in the Trenches

I began my journey as a Marriage and Family Therapist student at Western Seminary having no idea where it would take me, what people and situations I would encounter, or how much God was going to teach me about His grace and myself.

As a trainee, I was placed in a secular counseling program at Youth Services—part of the Santa Cruz Community Counseling Center—in Watsonville, CA. The program, *Escuela Quetzal* (EQ), was

no ordinary counseling program. EQ was a drug and alcohol program and clean & sober high school. It wasn't your traditional "50-minute hour" counseling sessions, rather "outside of the box" counseling in some fairly non-traditional locations (in the car, on a bench at lunchtime, on a white water rafting trip, on the sidewalk outside the office after determining if it was safe for a client to walk home). My clinical supervisor warned me that it was a notoriously challenging placement because the population consisted primarily of adolescent, drug

addicted gang members from rival Latino gangs. I remember hesitantly thinking, *"How am I, a white, middle-class, 20-something female going to be able to connect with primarily male, Latino, adolescent, drug addicted gang members?"*

I had to quickly learn the ins and outs of gang and drug culture in order to keep both the clients and myself safe. I learned the subtle nuances of certain whistles that indicated trouble, gang music that boomed from the cars that drove by, and letters and numbers that represented the various gangs throughout the city. I never wore red or blue to work. I prayed everyday to be protected and clothed with the Armor of God. Most days I felt like I was driving into battle in the trenches. It was a battle for the client's sobriety, healing, and ultimately their lives.

God taught me that I did not need to pretend to be something I was not in that environment. My story, experiences, and culture were polar opposites of these youth and that

was okay. God simply called me to show up everyday to be a firm yet loving and gracious presence in the lives of these young men and women. He opened my eyes to see them as someone's child, God's children, instead of gang members and addicts and oppositional-defiant teens. This is what helped me connect. When the going got tough—and boy did it get tough—the Spirit gave me the strength to be loving, joyful, peaceful, patient, kind, good, gentle and to model self-control. I had to come to terms with the possibility that all I was doing at EQ was seed planting. The "a-ha" moments were few and far between, relapses were prevalent, unhealthy choices were still made, arrests happened weekly, and the violence didn't stop. But, God is good. I have faith that the seeds that were planted will be watered and grow and produce fruit. God loves these young men and women far more than I, or any other therapist, ever could.

I ended up staying at EQ for seven years before transferring to my current role as an outpatient therapist in another Youth Services program. It was seven years of ups

and downs, joys and sorrows, successes and failures, and spiritual and therapeutic growth. God used this group of adolescent, drug-addicted gang members that I never, ever, in a million years, thought I would be able to connect with to teach me incredible things about His grace and power in my weakness.

When I married my husband Bryan in January 2012, God began to reveal how our ministry and my career as a therapist would grow to encompass a whole new group of people: Navy sailors and their families. Bryan is a current student at Western Seminary and a Chaplain Candidate in the United States Navy. God willing, we will one day be a military chaplain family and my knowledge and skills as a therapist can be put to use serving those who serve our country. As we begin this journey I find myself having some of the same hesitations I had when I was first placed at EQ, but I trust that God has something amazing to teach me through the process. He always does.

Thankful for You Year-Round

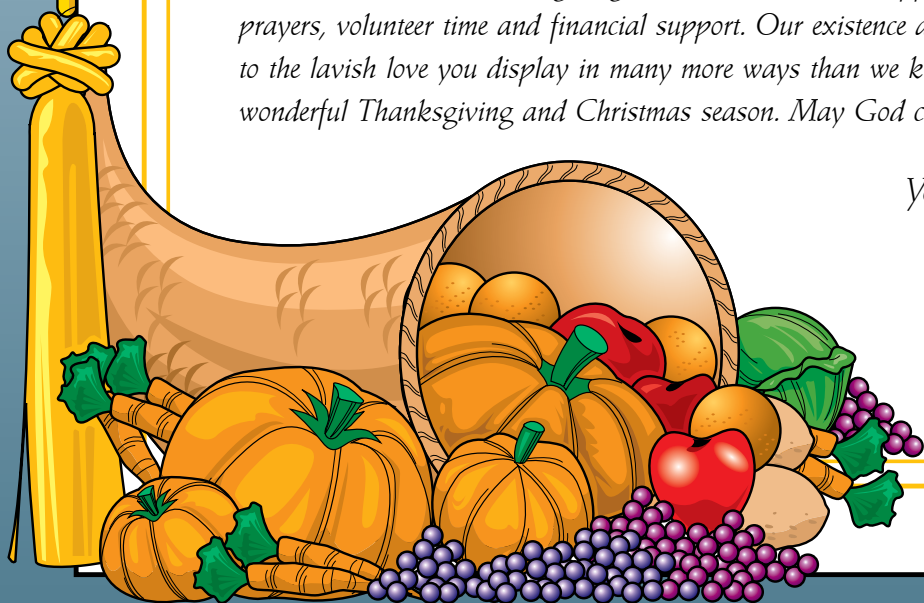
