

# 2011-2012 ANNUAL REPORT



## LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

he 2011–12 school year was an unusual one for Western. The good news was a record enrollment in both head count and credit hours and a charitable remainder unitrust (CRUT) maturing that brought approximately \$1.6 M into our unrestricted budget.



Yet, not counting that CRUT, we ran a deficit in our operating fund (with it, we of course had a large revenue surplus, even after covering this "loss").

#### What does all this mean?

**First,** it shows the value of deferred giving as the CRUT gives us some substantial capital to work with as we try to strengthen Western's financial base.

**Second**, it shows that our current budget is still too lean for a school the size of Western. When I compared our annual budget to seminaries with a similar number of students, I was again struck to find their budgets to be typically between 50–200% higher than ours. They are by no means extravagant in their expenditures, which shows just how resourceful Western is. For I often hear others express surprise that we are able to train so many students so well given the size of our budget.\* A gifted and committed team of colleagues is one explanation, but those people are long overdue for adjustments to already low salaries. In addition, some of our buildings need additional maintenance. So our budget needs to grow prudently in the coming days.

**Third,** we need your help for that to happen. You'll see in this report that Western students are already covering nearly 90% of the costs of their education. Gifts from people like you cover the rest. When I was a student, the ratio was closer to

50/50. Given the growing indebtedness students incur while earning the needed undergraduate degrees (currently the average student owes around \$27K before even setting foot on a graduate school campus), and then seeing them move on to comparatively low-paying ministry positions after graduation, should be a cause of concern for all who are concerned about the well-being of the church.

I know you agree that we need more leaders who are committed to the unique power of the gospel to change lives, and who bring that conviction to various ministry venues. Short-cuts in training leave us all vulnerable to the dangers of ministry malpractice: people are hurt and the reputation of both the church and our Lord is tarnished as a result. To help correct that, we need more people who not only understand the importance of well-trained leaders for the church, but who also will help ease the financial burdens involved in offering and receiving that training.

Western remains committed to providing trustworthy training that is theologically faithful, educationally sound, and resourceful in stewardship. As you will read in Greg Moon's column, investing in Western gives you an opportunity to be a resourceful steward as well, since this ministry multiplies your dollars through the spiritual transformation that occurs in and through our students and alumni. Thank you for prayerfully considering how the Lord might use you to make a difference. Every gift helps!





# **NEW SCHOLARSHIP AIDS STUDENT**

Between graduating in May from a Bible college in Massachusetts, becoming an Associate Pastor in Vancouver, WA over the summer, and marrying his wife on Sept 1st, Sam Cassese's life has recently been full of change. One thing, however, that has not changed is his long-standing desire to become a pastor. He's seen the transforming power of the gospel through various mentors and preachers, and has a passion to follow in their footsteps. Receiving the training needed to pursue that passion, however, would not have been possible without significant financial aid. As one of the initial recipients of



our new President's Pathways scholarships, Sam shares this message to those whose generosity helps fund that scholarship: "I thank you genuinely from the bottom of my heart; you are growing the Kingdom." Sam, being both college class president and valedictorian, and whose ministry gifts were quickly recognized by the church which hired him, exemplifies the kind of high-quality student whose path to trustworthy training can be blocked simply by financial need.

## **PORTLAND**

The past year saw exciting changes in Portland, including the launch of A New Day Counseling Center, which is now providing an excellent training opportunity for our counseling students while also serving the surrounding local community.

Another important development was the hiring of a new counseling professor, Dr. Elizabeth Wosley-George (pictured front cover, center). With more than twenty years of teaching and clinical experience, most recently at Portland State University, Dr. Wosley-George is a tremendous asset to students and a great addition to the faculty.



This year was also marked by Western's expanding influence throughout the Northwest as The Spurgeon Fellowship continued to develop its Wenatchee branch and made plans to hold their first meeting in Spokane, WA, this November. Faculty members were also actively involved in various Kingdom building initiatives like the Justice Conference and the Portland Youth Workers Conference.

## **SAN JOSE**

Now into its second full year of operation at our new site, the San Jose campus has a more established presence in the community. It has been gratifying to welcome and introduce so many prospective students to the new campus. Beyond classroom instruction, the campus has hosted diverse groups at our new location including a Bible software company, a counseling practitioners' network group, and pastoral/lay ministry leaders from various churches in the Bay Area.



Since introducing the Monday track of classes, the growth pattern of enrollment in classes during the week has continued. We are grateful that more people are committing to training as they desire to serve the body in a variety of strategic ministry roles, and we look forward to continuing our ministry to the Bay Area as a catalyst and resource for gospel-centered transformation.

# **SACRAMENTO**


While tuition revenue has been growing for several years, at the Sacramento campus it was primarily due to higher credit hour loads that students were taking. Fall 2011 marked a breakthrough in Sacramento's three year plateau at 120 students, as 150 students enrolled. We are grateful for the privilege to serve an increased number of students seeking advanced theological education.

Also, a full summer schedule was offered this past year rather than the lighter schedule which had been offered previously. Students are now able to take full course leads all three semesters, allowing them to complete their

Not only is Ivan the senior pastor is also a father of nine children. Not all nine of these kids, however, are biologically his own. Some are adoptees who were homeless or who came from broken homes. Nevertheless, all are loved like his own. This is just one way in which the entire Kirk family is living out their belief that we are to be disciple-makers in a way that models loving and sacrificial because of its gospel-centered approach and flexible scheduling options. He says to donors, "Thank you for investing in opportunities the dividends of your gift, but if we believe God's Word to be true, the rewards are out of this world!" Gifts for financial aid helps us keep tuition rates as low as possible and allows servants like Ivan the opportunity to train so he can become even more fruitful changing lives both in the church and at home.
