A Call To Minister - Eyes to See

On June 22, 2012, an online news report announced that a woman had been shot to death and found on a highway on-ramp in Oakland at 1:30 a.m. This homicide received four sentences. The last sentence was, "No arrests have been made." I didn't hear about this atrocity online, however. I heard about it from the executive director of a community-based organization that serves minor girls victimized by commercial sexual exploitation— sold as children for sex throughout the Bay Area. This young woman was a client of

this organization and eighteen years old. She was on the cusp of escaping captivity; then her window to freedom was shut by a gun. Understandably, the founder of this organization for trafficked girls was inconsolable.

I spent days between tears and rage, prayers and sleeplessness. This precious child of God was shot and tossed aside like garbage after years of being sold like a commodity. I thought about all those who failed her during her short, painful life: her family, her neighbors, her school, the police, and social services. All the

churches in her community. The entire Body of Christ.

I had been supporting local anti-trafficking organizations, including this one, for a few years. But the brutal injustice to this victim, paired with the raw anguish of my friend who loved her, was a tipping point in my heart.

So within two weeks, I applied for admission to Western Seminary to pursue an M.A. in Ministry and Leadership. This was

the first step in walking away from a 20-year career of sales and marketing in companies such as Bass Pro Shops, Remington Arms, and ESPN.

Five years before that woman's death was planned by her murderers in 2012, I was planning my own death in Seattle in 2007. I had just walked out of a second marriage after less than six months of matrimony, and I was mired in a couple of long-term addictions. I went to sleep every night plotting my suicide, and I woke up every morning hung-over. That was when Jesus left the ninety-nine and brought me back into his flock. A year later in May 2008, I was living in Livermore, California, attending Cornerstone Fellowship and starting a new sales director job.

At Cornerstone, I met an elementary school teacher in Hayward who shared that two of her students had never experienced Christmas. She didn't mean their Christmas presents were disappointing. She meant they had never had a Christmas tree, a Christmas decoration, a Christmas stocking, or a Christmas gift. Ever. A few days before Christmas 2008, she brought them to a Christmas tree lot, a dollar store, second-hand stores, and other places to patch together a hint of what most American children take for granted. She sent me text pictures at every stage, ending up with the girls laying on the floor in a pile of cheap gifts, used toys, wrapping paper, and stockings. All I could do, from the sidelines, was text her encouragement and tell her I would repay her whatever she spent. It was a genuine Christmas miracle through a Christian proclaiming the Gospel through deeds. And it was unfolding before me as a spectator.

I thought, "I want to be part of a Christmas miracle." God's answer seemed to be, "Then put on your seat belt and roll up your sleeves." What became known as "Hidden Treasures" was then birthed by this sister in Christ and me as an outreach ministry to the young in under-resourced homes in the East Bay, bringing them to church, taking them to baseball games, and filling in for dads at "father-daughter" dances. It includes helping mothers with food, gas, utilities, and

rent while lending a sympathetic ear and praying with them. The outreach extended beyond these families. It went to kids in juvenile hall, youth programs, and foster homes who have suffered the pain and trauma of neglect, abuse, homelessness, sexual assault, sex trafficking, addictions, domestic violence, and shootings.

So now, as a Western grad, I'm a semiemployed urban missionary and founder of a charitable organization called "Seek and Save" (http://bit.ly/seekandsave). Its mission is to bring the good news of Jesus Christ to under-resourced urban communities through words of God and acts of love. Its harvest field is low-income housing, juvenile hall, foster homes, shelters, and organizations for at-risk youth. It also assists churches through workshops and projects as they equip servant-disciples who literally go forth.

I don't know if that 18-year-old murdered in Oakland in June of 2012 was ever sought with acts of love and words of faith—whether at home, school, neighborhood, community center, juvenile hall, or foster care. But my "year-round Christmas miracle" seems to be doing so for many of the young treasures in the Bay Area who are oppressed with poverty, maltreatment, and crime as children while overlooked to the point of being hidden from adults.
