
## COURSE SCHEDULE

## COURSE DESCRIPTION

In this course you will examine the OT background to the NT, become familiar with the historical, social and cultural environment of the Gospels, study the teaching of Jesus and his particular self-understanding, and become familiar with each of the four Gospels.

**Recommended pre- or co-requisite:** *How to Read the Bible.*

## COURSE OBJECTIVES

By the end of this course each student should be able to:

- 1) Discuss the basic background, theological contributions and relevance of the books studied.
- 2) Identify and explain key canonical themes including Son of Man, Kingdom of God, Discipleship, the law and its purpose as well as God's redemptive design.
- 3) Explain the basic message of the books studied and how they advance the great story of the Bible.
- 4) Understand and apply the basic methods of Biblical study and be able to interpret and apply the Scriptures.

If your participation is a bit more than desired by the professor or graduate students, you may be asked to "*curb your enthusiasm.*" Please know that we value your contribution and look forward to seeing how God shapes us all—seminarian or not—during the class.

## RESPONSIBILITIES

### 1. Informal papers

You will write a total of seven informal (no citations necessary) papers of two pages (double-spaced). The topics are: #1 background to the Gospels, #2 the baptism and temptation, #3 Jesus and Kingdom of God, #4 Jesus and Son of Man, #4 Discipleship as Jesus understood it, #5 Jesus and ethics/moral reasoning, #6 the parables, #7 the miracles of Jesus. Each of these is worth 100 points.

More information will be provided in class.

### 2. Term paper

You will write formal paper (8-10 pages, double spaced) on a topic relevant to the Jesus and the Gospels. You must secure the approval of the professor for the topic in question.

### 3. Final Course Evaluation (15 min.)

Before the end of the last Friday of the semester (December 10, 2021), you will receive an email with a link to the final course evaluation. By federal law, we now need to ensure that students participate in classes for the full length of the class. Failure to complete the final course evaluation on time will result in a grade penalty and may impact your financial aid eligibility.
